6. Sangam - Weaving Traditions into Celebration

As part of Karvaan Fest, the EBSB Society proudly organized Sangam, a vibrant cultural event celebrating India's traditional arts, crafts, and expressions. This event provided a platform for students to showcase their creativity while embracing traditional aesthetics and values.

The event featured three engaging competitions, each designed to promote cultural expression:

Lok Alankaran— Participants were given a model design sheet and tasked with creating a traditional attire for the model, drawing inspiration from India's diverse cultural wardrobe. This activity encouraged students to explore the significance of regional clothing, embroidery, and accessories.



- **Chitra Shringar** — Painting the Nation's Pride — A face painting competition, where participants depicted India's national symbols or the theme of "Bindi Beauties." Some painted the peacock, lotus, Ashoka Chakra, or tricolor, while others used intricate bindi designs to reflect India's rich traditions.



- **poshak-e bharat** – Participants showcased traditional clothing, bringing them to life through dance, music, storytelling, and ramp walks. Some narrated the historical significance of their attire, while others performed folk dances and recited regional songs. The event beautifully highlighted the deep-rooted traditions behind India's clothing heritage.

Additionally, a small game stall was set up, offering visitors a fun and interactive activity, making Sangam a lively cultural fest.

To enhance the experience, renowned Kathak dancer Himanshi Gogini delivered a special performance, mesmerizing the audience with her graceful storytelling through dance. She also served as the judge for all three competitions, alongside Aarna, a social media influencer, and Khushi, her manager and content writer.



7. Digital Chronicles of Culture – Online Post Series

Beyond physical events, the EBSB Society leveraged digital platforms to keep cultural awareness alive throughout the year. Several online post series and competitions were launched to engage students virtually and provide insightful content about India's heritage, traditions, and history.



Following this, the society curated a special digital series on Sikkim, covering:


